TURN OFF electrical items that are not designed to be left on overnight

AVOID charging items
like laptops, mobile
phones or tablets
overnight. Don't put
them on soft furnishings,
beds and duvets as this
increases the chance of
them overheating
and catching fire



ESCAPEROUTES

Know your quickest way out in event of a fire

Keep exits clear of obstructions

Keep door and window keys in accessible place

ALWAYS use a plug adapter if you are bringing appliances from abroad

CHECK for the British or European safety mark when buying electrical appliances



CHECK cables and wires to make sure they are not frayed or damaged. Look for any scorch marks around sockets or plugs. DO NOT used wires/cables if they are damaged or frayed TOP TIP:

NEVER TAMPER WITH SMOKE ALARMS OR COVER THEM TO SMOKE OR VAPE. ALARMS HELP KEEP YOU SAFE, COVERING THEM WILL PUT YOU AT RISK

REMEMBER: Register your electrical appliances so that manufacturers can contact you about any repairs or recalls

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS



Living in private rented accommodation? Your landlord has to meet certain safety obligations. In all properties, the landlord must:

- Ensure gas appliances are installed and serviced every 12 months by a Gas Safe registered engineer
- Provide all new and existing tenants with a copy of the safety check record
- Maintain wiring and all electrical appliances they provide to ensure they are safe to use, make sure any furniture and furnishings they provide meet the fire resistance regulations
- By law, your landlord must install a working smoke alarm on every floor of the property and a carbon monoxide alarm in every room with a fixed combustion appliance (excluding gas cookers)



Consider using LED battery-operated candles instead of regular candles

Living in student halls? All universities and colleges have a designated person responsible for fire safety. If you spot something that doesn't look right, a potential fire risk or have any concerns, you should speak to them. It's important that you:

- Check what fire safety rules are in place for your halls of residence - are there any bans on candles in rooms?
- Pay attention to fire drills and NEVER ignore a fire alarm
- Do not prop open fire doors
